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RABBI'S FORUM

So I am writing to you from the midst of our Corona Virus Quarantine. Hopefully, by the time this goes to press we will have better news and be on our way back to normal, or whatever counts for normal.

In an average year, traditionally my article to you would be touching on the Holiday of Passover. This year is far from average, but I see no reason to alter tradition. I have been surprised at the number of memes and articles I have read that have tried to make light of all of this by using Pesakh as a backdrop. We have seen the list of "New Plagues," or the list that has every other item on the list of Steps of the Seder as "Urchatz—Washing the Hands." I know that this is just our way of coping with a difficult situation, but it is also a VERY Jewish response.

We have used the rituals and rhythms of Judaism to try to make sense out of what is happening in the world around us. In truth, Pesakh and the Seder, is this phenomenon in practice. We all know the part of the Seder where we open the door for Elijah. This custom originated in Medieval Europe. When Dr. Watson spoke to us recently he brought up the old 'Blood Libel' accusation, mainly that Jews needed the blood of gentile children to make Matzah. The custom of opening the door stemmed from this accusation, we opened the door to show our neighbors what we were up to inside; that is to say, just having dinner, nothing unseemly or inappropriate. How much the more so does it make sense to try to connect the challenges we are facing due to COVID-19, with the rhythms and rituals of Judaism.

This year, for all of us, our Seder will be different. We might very well ask, "Why is this YEAR different from every other year?" At the end of the Seder we end with the same appeal, "Next Year in Jerusalem!" Perhaps our pray this time should be, "Next year in a world that is back to normal."



CANTOR'S COLUMN

Everyone knows the story of Passover, even those who set foot in a synagogue once a year. Between Charlton Heston and Maxwell House, we all have learned the tale of the awesome liberation of the Hebrew slaves from Egypt. This year we will experience Passover with our immediate families only. Grandmom and grandpop will have to dial in on Skype or FaceTime to join us in the four questions. Let's not forget to reach out (safely) to our neighbors who may live alone and make sure to wish them a "Zissen Pesach!"

This Passover Seder will be a little bit different than in the past. We are practicing social distancing as they call it. This means we cannot squeeze in an extra place-setting at the dining table and invite all the cousins and friends to come join us. That's a very strange phenomenon. We are people whose religion, history, and ritual are all tied to gathering around food. And there is no better expression of this than the Passover Seder.

The Hebrew word for Egypt Is Mitzrayim, which literally means, "narrow place" or "straits." The idea of being in bondage in a narrow place and being led out to freedom really resonates with me right now. During this period of quarantine I am thinking about what it means to be free and what it means to be bound. The word quarantine comes from a combination of Italian and French, meaning "approximately forty." It refers to the period of time a ship would be held and isolated in the harbor. But there are religious connotations to the name. 40 days is the time that Noah and his family and the animals were bound up on the ark during the great flood. 40 days also correlates to the period of Lent, and the time that Jesus spent fasting in the desert in the Christian Bible.. Thus quarantine conveys not only a meaning of oppression but also an opportunity for introspection and preparation.

Just like we refer to the 40 weeks of pregnancy as "confinement," we can look at our confinement in our own homes as a preparation for a rebirth, a renaissance of the spirit. Because we will all be changed when this is over. As frightening as it is, as strange and unexpected as this forced confinement is, it forces us to break from our habits and routines and experience the sort of deep transformation that only visits upon us during life-threatening events. We can grieve for what we have lost, the predictability and comfort of the life we lead before this virus took over our world. But it is also important to look forward and plan for the good things to come.

Judaism actually has integrated this sort of time period of reflection and altered habit of living, tied to Passover. Beginning on the second Day of the holiday, Jews count the Omer. For 49 days a self-imposed period of restriction and study is observed, the centerpiece of which is the daily accounting. This attention to numbers would correlate with the Psalmist exhortation, "therefore teach us to number our days that we may acquire a heart of wisdom."

Just like the song,, "Dayeynu," lists all the good things God did for us when we were slaves in Egypt (and goes all the way forward and backward in creation,) we can also practice mindfulness and gratitude during these days in our own narrow places. If only we have our health... dayeynu. If only our family

members are safe... dayeynu. If only we have enough food to eat... dayeynu. If only we have a roof over our heads... dayeynu. I pray that we all come through this Mitzrayim whole and safe.

It's customary at the end of the Seder to recite the following hopeful words: "next year in Jerusalem!" The ancient aspiration that we all may be gathered in from exile is particularly resonant for us this year. We look forward to the day when we can reunite, greet one another, and celebrate once again in our own Temple, rebuilt with love and joy.

Being a parent in these trying times!

Never have I ever, is a silly game that is sometimes played.

Now, we all find ourselves living in Never have I ever...

These times are surely challenging! And for parents with children, or parents with children and older adult parents, this is especially true.

There is also so much information floating around out there, it is impossible to know what is reliable or accurate.

I did a bit of research and came across an article from the National Association of School Psychologists. The link is here, if you want to read the full article.

I think it is interesting that many of their suggestions correlate to the Jewish values that we have been discussing in our classrooms.

Remain calm and reassuring. This requires a great deal of GEVURAH, or inner strength. We are all facing this and we are all freaked out. No one likes uncertainty or not being in control. However, our children will pick up on our stress and anxiety. It also requires – *ACHRAYUT*, or responsibility, to continue to follow the imposed protocols and enforce those behaviors in your own families. Everything will be okay- but it may be a bumpy road till we get there. Breathe deeply and take it one day at a time.

Maintain a normal routine to the extent possible. I think this is connected to *HAKARAT HATOV* – Recognizing good or being grateful! If ever there was a time to count your blessings, it is NOW. How lucky are we all to be able to continue to...that we have homes and food, etc. If we emphasize what is the same (although with some slight modifications), as well as the good things – parents at home, etc. then our children may not focus on how things are different.

Review and model basic hygiene and healthy lifestyle practices for protection. SHMIRAT HAGUF means to protect the body. It has always been a parents' job to teach their children selfcare. You can review these things and point out that it is comes from the Torah, without creating little germaphobes.


Avoid Excessive Blaming/Monitor Television viewing and social media. *KOACH HADIBUR* is the power of your words. Watch your tone, and the way you speak about what is happening. Make sure that the news channels are NOT blaring

24/7, as this is truly sensory overload. Words can harm or heal. Please use your words carefully and protect your children from hearing things they may confuse or alarm them.

Make yourself available. This is CHESED –kindness. We MUST treat everyone with as much kindness and generosity as we can muster. It is also a time for us to reach out to others. This will also help us with Shalom Bayit – keeping peace in our homes. We can also continue to practice kindness to others. We CAN stay in touch with everyone, even though we cannot touch. Call/Facetime/Zoom relatives and friends, especially those that are isolated. This will be good for you and for your children. Think of the opportunities created by having this time to be with your families. Create new family rituals and discover new ways to connect and have fun together.





On the reverse of this letter is the Nomination Committees selection of candidates for the Board of Trustee positions, this too will be voted on at the June 9, 2020 Annual meeting. A ballot will be provided in a letter that will also include the annual budget and constitutional amendment changes.

From January 21 through March 11, 2020, our Reform Movement campaigned in the World Zionist Congress Election. This was the one democratic opportunity we had to have our Reform voices heard in Israel and throughout the world and to work to implement the values we hold dearly - pluralism, equality, freedom, and to ensure the future of Israel as a Jewish and democratic state.

In this year's election, Vote Reform/ARZA/Vote Reform and Reconstructionist Movement garnered 31,500 votes. Coming in first place, we remained the largest Zionist Organization in the United States and should not be taken for granted. Our's was one of hundreds of congregations who participated in encouraging every Reform Jew to cast their vote for the ARZA slate. It is because of our efforts as a community that our Movement was able to make waves across the country and the globe. We especially want to thank Marty Eisenberg, our congregation's captain and the Israel Committee, for their dedication and hard work on behalf of this campaign! For those who voted we look forward to hosting a lunch for you shortly.

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


